When my oldest daughter was seven, I learned from a teacher's aide I ran into at the grocery store that Mardee had been put into a remedial reading program at school. When I confronted Mardee's teacher, I was told, "Face it, Chris. Mardee is slow." To make a long story short, the "slow" child turned out to have an IQ higher than most of her peers and is currently on track to graduate in December with highest honors from the University of Colorado having made the Dean's Honor Roll every semester of her college career. She has studied overseas, been named Outstanding Intern of the Year, is an academic scholarship recipient, and is conversationally fluent in Italian. She is still dyslexic. What made the difference? The Rocky Mountain Unit of Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic.

RFB&D, a nonprofit volunteer organization, is the nation's educational library serving people who cannot effectively read standard print because of visual impairment, dyslexia, or other physical disability. The mission is to create opportunities for individual success by providing and promoting the effective use of education materials. The vision is for ALL people to have equal access to the printed word.

It's estimated that 15% of all people are dyslexic, with over 3 million students in the United States in need of textbooks and learning materials on tape. In Colorado alone there are over 32,000 identified students in over 1700 schools that could use RFB&D's support. At present, RFB&D serves only 2,000 students in 100 schools. 



Stephen White

Guest of Honor Stephen White is the author of the New York Times bestselling Alan Gregory novels. Stephen grew up in New York, New Jersey, and Southern California and attended the University of California campuses at Irvine (where he lasted three weeks as a creative writing major) and Los Angeles before graduating from Berkeley in 1972. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Colorado in 1979. After receiving his doctorate, White



worked in private practice and at the University of Colorado health Sciences Center, and later as a staff psychologist at Children's Hospital in Denver. He began his first novel, *Privileged Information*, in 1989 while he was still practicing full time. In his books, he draws upon his years of clinical practice

as a psychologist to create intriguing plots and complex, believable characters. Stephen White

Q: Your character, Alan Gregory, is a clinical psychologist like you. Does the similarity end there? How much of Stephen White is reflected in Alan Gregory?

A: The similarities don't exactly end there but there's no need to exaggerate them, either. I lived in Boulder on and off for fifteen years; Alan still lives there. Although neither of us is a model of mental health, his neuroses are different than mine. And he has advantages that I never had as a psychologist. First, he has the benefit of all my years of experience. And second, I get to think about his lines as long as I'd like. Real patients never have that luxury.

Q: In what ways does your writing benefit from your training in psychology?

A: There are two benefits of my previous experience

as a psychologist that I consider invaluable to my life as a writer. The first is that my work gave me a chance to observe and study the infinite varieties of motivation that human beings have for their behavior. The other is that being a psychotherapist exposed me to dialogue in its purest form. For eight to ten hours a day over a period of fifteen years I had the privilege of sitting and listening to a wide variety of people just talk. I can't imagine a better training ground for writing dialogue.

Q: Alan Gregory's wife Lauren is living with Multiple Sclerosis. What feedback have you received from fans, people with MS, and health care workers, about your portrayal?

A: I would estimate that about half my mail involves readers' reaction to Lauren having MS. The overwhelming sentiment I hear is one of gratitude, whether for the fact of the portrayal of the illness, the reality of the portrayal of its effect on Lauren's life, or for the nature of the portrayal – that I present her as a vibrant, interesting, sexual being despite her illness. People who have MS and people who work with MS patients have been especially supportive.

Q: What kind of books do you like to read?

A: My reading is eclectic. I read a relatively equal mix of fiction and non-fiction and find that research reading takes up more and more of my time. The longer I write crime fiction, however, the less of it I tend to read.

Q: What makes Boulder a prime location for your novels?

A: Boulder is as important to me as the fictional village is to Jim Carrey in The Truman Show. Boulder is scenic, it's witty, it's intelligent, it's malleable, it's stubborn, it's idealistic, it's naïve. It's a town I could never make up, and if I did, I'm not sure anyone would believe me.

Q: Which of your books is your favorite and why?

A: The simplest answer to this question is that my favorite book is the one that I am currently writing. The reason is simple: I like to think that I'm getting better at this process and that each book reflects my maturation as a writer.


But it is also true to say that each of the earlier

books are dear to me for some specific reason. **Privileged Information** because it was the first, **Higher Authority** because it was such a departure for me at that stage of my career, **Critical Conditions** because of the challenge of writing characters from an adolescent point of view.

Q: In your novels you've taken on issues of managed health care, the Mormon Church, the cult of celebrity. Is it your intention to make a social or political statement in each novel?

A: Writing a book is a laborious, lengthy process. I feel strongly that if I, as the writer, don't stay interested in the work, neither will any reader. So I pick topics that fascinate me or trouble me or captivate me, topics that will stay interesting even as I proceed to examine them from many different directions.

Although I don't intend to make political or social statements with my work, the exploration of controversial topics usually involves the precipitation of polarizing conflicts between characters. From polarization inevitably comes point of view. Thrillers are good stories that take readers for a ride. I like to learn something along the way as I'm writing, and I like to offer readers an opportunity to learn something along the way if they are interested in doing so. I like to think each book is about something.

Toastmaster

Elaine Viets

Lauthor of two mystery series. Her Dead-End Job series is a satiric look at a serious subject—the minimum-wage world—and Publishers Weekly called her hardcover debut "wry social commentary." Her second series features St. Louis mystery shopper, Josie Marcus. Its debut, Dying in Style, tied with Stephen King on the Independent Mystery Booksellers bestseller list.

She is the winner of both the Agatha and Anthony Awards, and, Lori Lacefield, LCC 2008's newsletter editor, recently caught up with her to ask a few questions.

Q: Elaine, tell us a bit about each of the series you write. When did you begin each and what sparked the initial idea?

A: I write two series: the Dead-End Job series and the Josie Marcus Mystery Shopper series.

My first Dead-End Job mystery was published by Signet in 2003. **Shop Till You Drop** is now in its tenth printing. The Dead-End Job series is a post–9/11 series. Many of my friends and neighbors were doing well until the stock market crash that followed that horror. Then the Ivy League colleges for the kids, new house, and plans to retire at 45 were gone. So were many good corporate jobs. Instead, they found themselves selling dresses

or bagging groceries at the local supermarket. It was a whole different (and unprotected) world. The only power they ad was to quit suddenly.

My character, Helen Hawthorne and I work a different low paying job in each book. I've worked as a bookseller, telemarketer, shop clerk, survey taker, pet boutique clerk, and more. The first lesson I learned was that clerks are invisible. They put up with an almighty amount of abuse.

When Penguin asked me to write a mystery shopper series. I was delighted. My mother worked as a mystery shopper in the 1960s. Surprisingly, the job has changed very little in nearly fifty years. Even the questionnaires the mystery shoppers use are the same.

Q: I love your Dead-End Job Series. I understand you've worked all of them at some point in real life. Has there been a dead-end job that you've actually enjoyed working?

A: I loved working in a bookstore, but it's physically hard labor. My back hurt at the end of the day from carrying those heavy books, which weigh about a pound a piece.

Q: Do people often suggest other jobs to you? Have you used any of them?


A: Yes, and I'm always interested, but many of them are too close to a series Penguin already has. So far, I've found all the dead-end jobs of my own.

Q: I think humor is one of the toughest things to write. There seems to be such a fine line between funny and eyerolling. Plus, you have to have just the right amount sprinkled in. How do you maintain that balance in your books?

A: I have a good editor, Kara Cesare, who tells me when she thinks I've

gone over the top. Also, I wrote a syndicated column for United Media. You quickly get a feel about how far you can go without outraging the public.

Q: I know you live in south Florida now so finding interesting characters must be pretty

easy;) Which of your characters have you found you found your fans resonate with most?

A: Margery Flax, the 76-year-old landlady of The Coronado Tropic Apartments, where Helen lives. Many people wish Margery was their mother.

Q: How did Margery Flax end up becoming a character in your books?

A: The real Margery is MWA's office manager. She won an auction at Bouchercon, I think, to be a character in my old series. But that series was discontinued. I offered Margery a chance to be a young bimbo, a homicide detective, or an old woman. She chose to be the old woman, as long as she could smoke and wear purple. I gave her both of those, but refused to let her drive a red Ferrari. Everyone knows if you're over sixty, you have to drive a large white car in Florida. It's the law.

Q: How did you land the gig as Toastmaster for LCC 2008?

A: Christine Goff asked me, and I was thrilled. I think the mountains are beautiful. The only mountain we have in Florida is Mt. Trashmore, and it's made of....well, trash.

Q: Everyone was saddened to hear of your stroke last year but are overjoyed at your speedy recovery. Where you surprised at how the mystery community came together to help promote your book in your absence?

A: I was touched by how many writers helped, but not surprised. The mystery community is very generous.

Q: To date, what are your plans for next year? What books do you have forthcoming and here will you be promoting?

A: My third Josie Marcus mystery shopper series, *Accessory To Murder*, will be published in November. The seventh dead-end job series, *Clubbed To Death*, will be out in May 2008. It's set in a country club. I'm hoping to tour in May.

Michael Masliah

Michael, tell us about yourself. How did you come to be such a big fan of crime fiction?

A. I was born in LA at the beginning of the baby boomer generation and was raised and still reside in the San Fernando Valley. I graduated from the LAUSD in 1964 when you still could get a decent education. I entered UCLA in 1964 but dropped out in 1966. I worked in my family's business and as an independent book scout and starting selling used books at local swap meets. I reentered UCLA in 1975, received a BA in 1977 and a

MLS in 1979. I spent a year working as a substitute librarian for the Los Angeles Public Library system and starting working for the County of Los Angeles Public Library system in January 1981.

I've worked at several different branches through the years but have been at the Culver City branch for quite a while. I worked in reference/government services for a long time and currently work as a reference/audio-visual librarian. I've developed a special Judaica collection for the County housed here at Culver City. I've created a list (not quite a bibliography) of Jewish mysteries that is still growing. I've also worked with the fiction coordinator for the county (we have over 80 branches) and currently I am the gatekeeper of the monthly Nextreads mystery list.

Q. Are there particular sub-genres that you like more than others? What did you read as a kid?

A. I wasn't a real big reader as a kid. I read boys adventure books, Hardy Boys books and even a few Nancy Drews. When I was in the 10th grade, my school belonged to the Scholastic Book Club. I bought a copy of *Murder She Said*, a Christie movie tie-in, and was hooked. I spent summer vacation reading most of Agatha Christie. I discovered a half price used bookstore nearby (ah, the good old days as new paperbacks were 25-50 cents each).

I pefer mystery and detective series over crime dramas. I still like to figure out "who done it." I like all kinds of mysteries from soft-boiled to hard-boiled. My current favorites are Michael Connelly and Peter Robinson and past favorites include Arthur

W. Upfield and Fredric Brown.

Q. Do you participate in any listsery or reading group discussions?

A. I currently belong to several Sherlock Holmes scion societies of the Baker Street Irregulars.

I have worked on several small conventions, Sherlockon II and Holmes West & Holmes West at Occidental College. It houses the Ned Guyman collection which includes a Beeton's Christmas Annual from 1887, the first appearance of Sher-

lock Holmes. We had a lot of headaches putting them on, but were happy and relieved when they were over. Putting on a larger convention such as LCC or Bouchercon has many more headaches and problems. I admire people for tackling them.

I moderate a monthly mystery book club at my library for the last 7-8 years. I make a list of about a dozen books with a brief promo and the group picks one. The only requirements are that there is at least 15 copies in our system and that we haven't previously read a book by the same author before.

Q.If you could become any protagonist in any novel, who would it be and why?

A. I've never thought about what character in a novel I would want to be. But I wouldn't mind being "tu7ckerized."

Q. When did you first learn of Left Coast Crime and how many have you attended?

A. I have attended most of the LCCs since the third one in Anaheim. I refused to go to the one in Anchorage in February. I'm from sunny Southern California. I was signed up for the one in Monterey but was too ill to attend. I was a corresponding member in 2006, as I couldn't afford to go to Bristol. Librarians don't make a lot of money. Celebrity Chef

Joanne Pence

S an Francisco native Joanne Pence grew up amid the rich cultural diversity and culinary excellence of that city. A graduate of U.C. Berkeley with a master's degree in journalism, Joanne has taught school in Japan, written for magazines and worked for the federal government. Fiction writing, however, always has been her first love. Her background is reflected in her critically acclaimed, award-winning mystery series. The series combines mystery with humor, romance and food. It features Angelina Amalfi, an underemployed journalist and gourmet cook, and San Francisco homicide inspector Paavo Smith. Angie wants two things in life—a good job, and Paavo—but culinary crime and murder keep getting in the way.

The series has won an Independent Booksellers' Golden Scroll Award. Under the category of Romantic Suspense, *Too Many Cooks* received a Gold Certificate from RomCon and Reviewer's Choice from Romantic Times. Something's Cooking was nominated for a RITA by the Romance Writers of America, and To Catch A Cook was nominated for a Daphne DuMaurier award in Mystery, a Golden Quilll award in Romantic Suspense, and a Reviewer's Choice award for Best Amateur Sleuth. Joanne was nominated for a 2007 Romantic Times Career Achievement Award.

Joanne now lives north of Boise, Idaho with her husband, sons, and a plethora of pets. She is not a gourmet cook.

Q: Joanne, how long have you been writing the Angie Amalfi series and how did you decide on her as a character?

A: I've written fourteen Angie Amalfi mysteries, one



a year beginning in 1993. That seems so long ago! My main idea for Angie was to make her very different from many of the female sleuths popular at the time I first conceived of her (late 80's). Lots of them were loners, they were "curious"— by that I mean they went around asking people about cases, and many had more-or-less dysfunctional relationships. Angie has a large

Italian family with four older sisters, and there's lots of love in the family although they often have their "differences" as families do. She doesn't want to get involved in mysteries or crime because she's too busy with her life—mainly trying to find a career that will make her family (especially her father) proud, and for the first ten books, trying to get her somewhat reluctant boyfriend, Homicide Inspector Paavo Smith, to propose. Paavo is reluctant only because he believes he's wrong for Angie, even though he does love her.

The books are a mixture of a somewhat droll, urbane humor which surrounds Angie and whatever she's up to in the story; a grittier, darker edge in the police procedural side which Paavo Smith is

investigating; and then "something" that causes the two elements to intertwine and (hopefully) all work together in the end.

Q: You say on your website that you aren't a gourmet chef. What made you decide to write culinary mysteries then?

A: As I mentioned, the books have a humorous side. In the very first book, Angie, who actually is a gourmet cook, was a food columnist-or, at least, that's how she saw herself. Actually, she wrote a tiny column that was filler in an "advertiser" filled with ads and coupons and delivered free to households twice a week. She printed recipes from readers, and one of her frequent contributors used the recipes as a way to get coded messages out to his conspirators. So it was the newspaper and the fake recipes (some of which were truly awful) that were important. I wrote the book as a "stand-alone", not as a series, and I didn't even know there was such a thing as a "culinary mystery" sub-genre. When my editor contacted me and asked for a second book with the same characters, and added, "And you will be serious about food in the next book, won't you?" no one was more surprised than I. Of course I said, "Yes!" And immediately began to buy cookbooks.

Q: What are your fans most frequent questions for you?

A: The most frequent question, bar none is "When are Angie and Paavo going to get married?" This is usually followed by a discussion of other sleuth couples who married and how it either ruined or



juicy liver served very rare...No we'll refrain from that, but whatever the final result is, it'll be fun.

Q: What's next for you?

A: As much as I love Angie and Paavo and have had great fun writing them, the last few books have started out much longer and darker than what eventually went to print. I write one book a year, and since book ten, I've wanted to take the time to write something longer and darker, but with Angie books under contract, I haven't been able to take the time. S o after lengthy conversations with my agent, I'm taking a hiatus to do what I've been thinking about for a long time. I have no idea what the result will be, but whatever the result, I'm enjoying the break. At the same time, I wouldn't be surprised if Angie doesn't demand to have another story told. And if she does, I'll be sure to listen to her.

helped the series. My answer, by the way, is that I'm not sure —and I honestly think that with this particular series, for the two of them to marry would hurt the dynamics of the two main characters plus all those who interact with them. So...they aren't going to get married soon.

Q: Are there other conferences that you attend? What do you think makes LCC unique?

A: Although I've attended a number of Bouchercons, several Malice Domestics, Novelists' Inc., RWA, and many number of smaller conferences throughout the country, the ones I most often attend and most enjoy are Left Coast Crime and Murder in the Grove. The latter takes place in Boise, Idaho, where I now live. Since 2005, I've been on the conference committee. It's a great, small conference, and Idaho is a beautiful state. Left Coast Crime is special is that it moves to a new location each year, and no two conferences are alike. It's always fresh, always fun.

Q: What's your role with LCC 2008 and what plans do you have for the event? Are you playing a role in the Alferd E. Packer Banquet?

A: My role is pure fun. I'm the "Celebrity Chef." I tell you, Angie Amalfi would be proud – and probably very jealous. As far as the banquet, have you ever wanted to have a mystery writer for dinner? This will be your chance. Literally. Good old Alferd made Hannibal Lecter look like a piker! I can't reveal much about the plans, but let's say goose flesh should be the order of the day, with a bit of steak tartar, or

Q: You are a multitalented person—writer of the Stanley Hastings PI series and the Puzzle Lady mystery series, actor, singer—tell us, what the latest is in regards to your career?

A: I was thinking of becoming an astronaut.

Q. Though the series are very different, both have elements of humor—something difficult to write well. Does humor just come naturally to you, or do you have some techniques you can share with the reader?


A: Humor? I thought I wrote suspense novels. This is very bad news. I may have to reassess my career.

Q. Tell us a bit about your series, and tell us what's in store for Stanley and/or Cora?

A: Stanley finds a moral justification for working for a contract killer in Hitman. Cora solves a sudoku and gets her hair done in The Sudoku Puzzle Murders.

Q. What kind of books do you like to read?

A: I grew up on Erle Stanley Gardner's Perry Mason novels, moved on the Agatha Christie, and branched out from there. Robert B. Parker's Spenser books were the inspiration for Stanley Hastings. Cora Felton has been called "Miss Marple on steroids," or "Jessica Fletcher meets Groucho Marx." The Steve Winslow courtroom dramas, written by my good



friend J. P. Hailey, are based on the early Perry Mason novels.

Q. What is your involvement with LCC, and what do you have in store for attendees? Do you come with a warning label?

A. I was thinking of giving out cookies (it worked for Diane Mott Davidson), but my baking skills are suspect. I believe I am on two panels, but I am not sure where or when. If you see me wandering around looking lost, please point me in the right direction.

Q: Your reputation for song precedes you. How many ditties have you crafted in all, and is there somewhere

folks can go to hear them?

A: More to the point, is there somewhere people can go to avoid them? I have sung at Left Coast, Bouchercon, Malice Domestic, Magna Cum Murder, MidAtlantic Mystery, the American Crossword Puzzle Tournament, and the Edgar Awards. I have sung onstage at a Pete Seeger concert, and to Eddie Fisher in his dressing room at the Latin Casino. At the Bouchercon Banquet in Chicago, Dennis Lehane offered me forty dollars not to sing. I sang anyway, hoping if I held out the price would go up.

I will be accepting bids at the banquet.



Why we named the banquet after a Colorado cannibal

You have your folk heroes—actual people whose deeds have become legend, like Daniel Boone and Johnny Appleseed. And then you have your folk villains—and in this category, Colorado has the dubious honor of claiming Alferd (or Alfred) Packer, one of the only citizens of the US ever convicted of cannibalism.

The facts: In the fall of 1873, a party of men left Salt Lake City heading for the gold fields in the mountains of Colorado. They started out in high spirits, thinking of the riches to come. But they encountered barren wastes and snowy mountains, and were about to turn back in despair when they came upon an Indian camp. The Indians took them to the chief, and they were fed and sheltered until they had recovered from their adventure thus far.

Advised by Chief Ouray that the winter would be even worse than what they'd previously encountered and they should turn back, ten of the party members took that very excellent advice. The other ten decided



to forge on with their original plan. Chief Ouray gave them provisions and suggested they follow the Gunnison River, which would take them to the Los Pinos Agency. Four of them did, but Packer talked the other six into striking off heading for the headwaters of the Rio Grande, where rich mines were said to have been discovered.

In February of 1874, two of the four men who had followed the Gunnison arrived, on the verge of starvation, at the Los Pinos Agency, the other two having perished of exposure and starvation. The group led by Packer was assumed to have been lost.

Then, in March of 1874, Packer also appeared at the Agency, described as "wild-looking" and bloated of face but otherwise in good condition. He said his five companions had deserted him when he became ill. However, he was well supplied with money, and bought many rounds of drink, during which his story slipped a bit, to the point where those listening to him began to suspect that he had, in fact, killed his companions and taken their cash.

Even worse, the investigation clearly pointed to Packer having murdered and eaten his companions, and he later confessed to it. In fact he confessed to several different versions. In one version one of his companions had shot the others while Packer was gathering firewood, and

attempted to kill Packer when he returned to camp—so it was self defense.

No one assumed Packer was innocent, particularly when he tried to assault a member of the party he was leading to find the bodies of the men. In June, when thing had thawed somewhat, an artist discovered the remains of Packer's party, which indicated the truth of Packer's confession—at least the part where he said he'd eaten them. He was charged with five murders,

but escaped.

Nine years later, in March of 1883, authorities caught up with him in Laramie County, Wyoming, where he was said to be involved with a gang of outlaws. He was brought back to Colorado, tried, and found guilty, with the death penalty attached. He immediately appealed and was granted a new trial. This time the verdict was guilty but the sentence was eight years for each offense, for a total of 40 years. He was pardoned in January of 1901, and moved to a ranch in Deer Creek, Colorado (where he was said to have become a vegetarian), and died in 1907.

were seven Demmycrats in Hinsdale County and you et five of 'em!"

The truth: The actual sentencing statement read: "Close your ears to the blandishments of hope. Listen not to the flattering promises of life, but prepare for the dread certainty of death." It should be noted that, as all the men came from Salt Lake City, there was no particular reason for

the judge even to have known their political affiliation—if any.

For some reason, Packer caught on as a legend in popular culture. His case was written up in *Celebrated Criminal Cases of North America*, by Thomas S. Duke (1910), and inserted as a direct quote from there into Dashiell Hammett's *The Thin Man* (1929). Phil Ochs wrote a folk song about him, "The Ballad of Alferd Packer" (1964), with the refrain: "They called him a murderer, a cannibal, a thief; It just doesn't pay to eat anything but Government-inspected beef." In 1968 students at the University of Colorado named the grill in the student union the Alferd G. Packer Memorial Grill, with the motto "Have a friend for lunch!" The cafeteria in the U.S. Department of Agriculture was also briefly named the Alfred Packer Memorial Grill (the plaque proving it resides at the bar of the National Press Club). Packer has also inspired a 1999 movie, *Ravenous*, and *Cannibal: The Musical* by Trey Parker (of *South Park* fame).

His legend has also been the subject, over the years, of various mock trials, continuing

investigations, CSI-style tests, and a pardon (in 1981).

In short, he's the kind of folk villain mystery fans can really sink their teeth into.

When LUCINDA SCHROEDER graduated from college in 1974, her father told her to "go federal." Prior to 1971, it was illegal for women to carry a firearm in federal service, so there were very few women in federal law enforcement. Even in 1974, managers were reluctant to make those first few female hires, but Lucinda persisted and became the third female special agent hired by the U.S. Fish and






work this event into his next screenplay. Anthony shook his head.


